

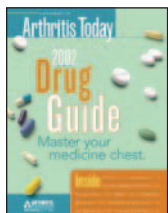
Online Journal Update

One of the premiere sources of reviewed biomedical literature online is **HighWire Press** (<http://highwire.stanford.edu>). They have recently revamped their Web site, and they provide



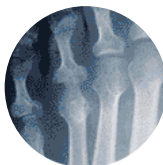
a multitude of features, allowing you, for instance, to search their journal collection and Medline simultaneously. You can also arrange to be alerted by e-mail each time your favorite journal becomes available online, or when your favorite biomedical author publishes a new article. Users can create lists of "favorite journals" and find HighWire articles by using an intriguing TopicMap system. Related to pharmacology publications on the Web, Nature has just launched a new review journal, **Nature Reviews—Drug**

Arthritis

Two review articles in this issue (D'Acquisto et al., pp 22–35, and Song et al., pp 36–46) are devoted to novel therapeutic approaches to inflammatory diseases such as arthritis. If you don't know the difference between a biologic response modifier (BRM) and a disease-modifying antirheumatic drug (DMARD), then the **Arthritis Foundation** has a Web page just for you (<http://www.arthritis.org/conditions/drugguide/drugtypes.asp>). As a hint, the article in this issue (Song et al.) about new inhibitors of cytokine activity fall under the category of BRMs, whereas more traditional drugs that must be administered over time before producing noticeable relief, such as oral gold, belong to the list of DMARDs. The **Johns Hopkins School of Medicine** also has a comprehensive Web page on many aspects of arthritis (<http://www.hopkins-arthritis.som.jhmi.edu>).
