### The NHS Improvement Network

The Improvement Network (TIN) is an initiative of the NHS Executive aiming to 'enable people in the NHS and its partner organisations to improve services by using what works in their different local contexts'. Hoping to disseminate good practice within the NHS, the site provides a range of services including a directory of service improvement projects, a mailing list, and access to the Trent Electronic Library for Health (TELH). Registration is required to access some areas within the site.

### Human genetics

A new report from the Human Genetics Commission (HGC), entitled *Inside information—balancing interests in the use of personal genetic data*. This report focuses on the storage and protection of personal genetic information, and provides a series of recommendations to the Government on this issue. They were formerly based at the University of Sheffield, and transferred to the Community Health Sheffield NHS Trust (CHS) in October 1999. The site contains information about the staff and their publications, recent contracts, and a brief description of the courses they run.

The Chartered Society of Physiotherapy (CSP) has recently relaunched its Web site. It provides a range of information about the CSP, covering what physiotherapy is, careers information, life-long learning,

New features include PHYSIO2U which provides access to practising physiotherapists in the UK and an enhanced jobs on-line feature.

### Cochrane access

The Cochrane Library is now available freely to anyone in the UK, through a NeLH initiative. Previously only available via Athens or to those in the NHS, anyone with a registered computer 'IP address' can now either log on anonymously or register a username and password. The Cochrane Library provides access to seven databases (covering evidence-based medicine and research methodology), including the Cochrane Database of Systematic Reviews (CDSR) and the Database of Abstracts of Reviews of Effectiveness (DARE).

### Evidence-Based On-Call

Evidence-Based On-Call is a new database of evidence-based recommendations on the diagnosis and management of a range of conditions, aimed at hospital clinicians. A total of 38 on-call medical conditions are covered, with links to summaries of the evidence, and supporting evidence. Produced by the Oxford Centre for Evidence-based Medicine.

### The Medical Algorithms Project

The Medical Algorithms Project has collected over 3500 algorithms useful in healthcare. The algorithms have been obtained from searches of the biomedical literature. They are implemented in an Excel workbook and the documentation is in PDF format. The software can be freely downloaded and used for non-commercial purposes, but acknowledgement of the source is required in published work. Terms of use and disclaimers are clearly given on the Web site. The Project has been developed by Quanta Healthcare Solutions, Inc., set up by two medical researchers.

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
